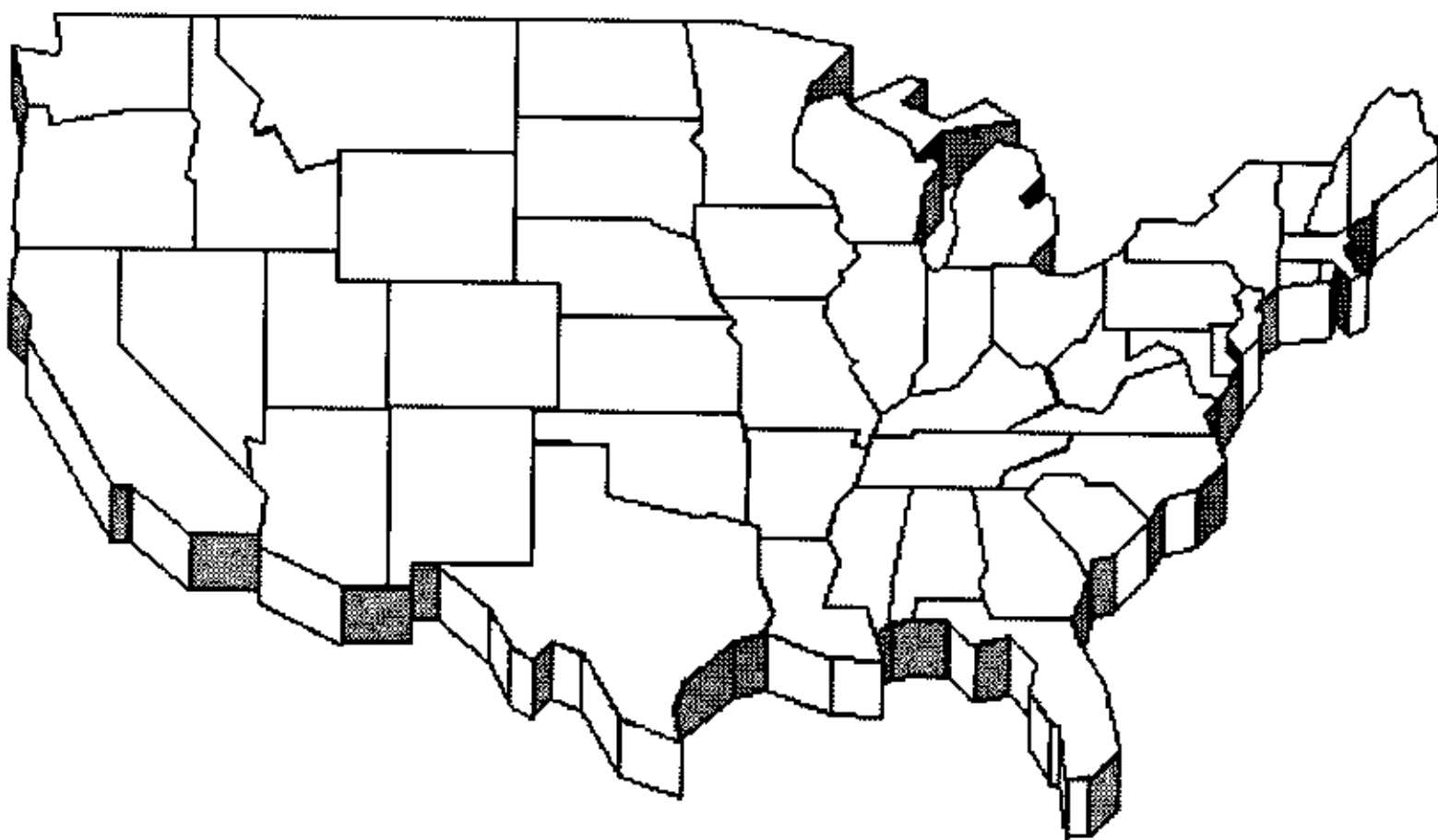

WASHINGTON—New figures released by the U.S. Census Bureau show that Asians and Hispanics are the fastest-growing populations in the United States.

Additional Census data show that the growth of these two groups are being shown at the voting booth. The number of Asians and Hispanics who voted in congressional elections increased significantly between 1994 and 1998, while the overall number of voters nationwide dropped, the Census Bureau said.

Between July 1, 1990, and July 1, 1999, the nation's Asian and Pacific Islander population grew 43.0% to 10.8 million, and the Hispanic population grew 38.8% to 36.3 million, the Census estimates show.

Nationally, the country's white population increased 7.3% between 1990 and 1999 to 224.6 million. Blacks remained the nation's largest minority group, showing a 13.8% rise to 34.8 million, while the American Indian and Alaska Native population increased 15.5% to 2.3 million.

Historically, most immigrants to the United States came from Europe. But by 1999, there had been a dramatic shift in the countries of origin of immigrants living in the United States. In 1999, more than half—51%—came from Latin America and 37% from Asia, while only 16% came from Europe. The shift has brought more racial and ethnic diversity among immigrants. In 1890, only 1.4% of immigrants were nonwhite. By 1999, more than 85% were nonwhite.

LOS ANGELES—The death toll from Tuesday's train crash in Hollywood, the nation's worst in nearly four decades, rose to at least 70, police said.

An express train plowed into a two-car commuter train that apparently ran straight through a red light, Sgt. Joseph Rizzoli, a police spokesman, said. "If you asked me, I'd say the engineer on the commuter train was drunk or on drugs. No way he could have missed the signal. He's a murderer in my book."

Sgt. Rizzoli said more than 100 people were injured, with the death toll expected to rise.

"Some of the people we pulled out were barely alive. I don't see how they could survive, he added.

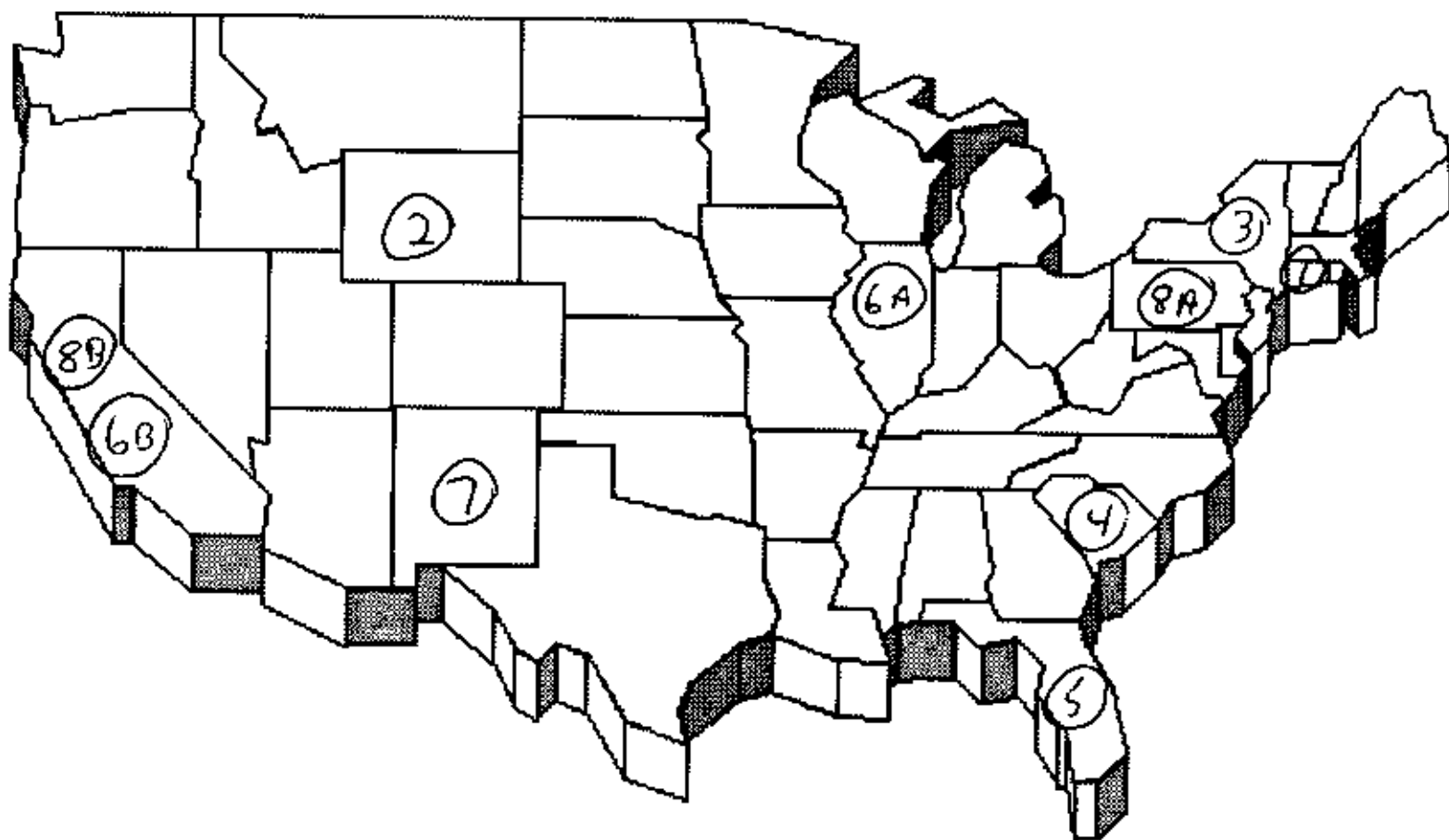
