Find the first **independent clause** in the story and list the **simple subject**, **simple predicate** and **direct object**. In other words:

WHO	
did WHAT	
to WHOM	?
WHERE was it done?	?
Now look for <b>dependent clauses</b> and <b>parti</b>	cipial phrases.
A participial phrase might tell you WH you care about the <b>verb</b> :	Y
(A car bomb exploded in Beirut today, <b>killi</b>	ng a former prime minister.)
A <b>relative clause</b> often tells WHY you care about the <b>subject</b> or <b>object</b> :	

(The man who performed the world's first heart transplant died today.)

## REMEMBER: If your headline's verb comes from a relative clause, you have the wrong headline:

Man performs heart transplant
- vs. Heart transplant pioneer dies

Which noun is more important to your story:

SUBJECT (think active voice) or OBJECT (think passive voice)?

Can you omit any grammatical steps?

Smith files a lawsuit against Jones subj verb direct object indirect object

Smith sues Jones subj verb direct object

A man who was charged in last week's robbery subj relative clause prepositional phrase

A suspect in last week's robbery prepositional phrase
